Creager Field Green Waste And Recycling Drop-Off

At the Creager Field parking lot adjacent to Shafor and Irving (by Oakwood Dog Park), you will find dumpsters for drop-off of yard debris and recyclable materials. There are separate containers for cardboard and for co-mingled recyclables (glass, plastics, metal, etc.). These containers are accessible 24-7 and are for Oakwood residents only. The more green waste and recyclables that we remove from the landfill stream, the cheaper it is to operate our city refuse collection program.

School News

NASA's Mohawk Man ignites student interest in STEM

In December, NASA engineer Bobak Ferdowsi made a connection with students at OJHS/ OHS as he fielded questions about NASA missions, whether Mars is habitable, current technology, and mechanical engineering. He also shared his message of inspiration, curiosity, and the future of exploration with parents and community members at an evening presentation.

Ferdowsi told students that reading science fiction as a child spurred his interest in space, and that his job involves some really 'cool' physics and science. He stressed the importance of an education, collaborative thinking, and teamwork.

Social media has provided a lot of attention to recent NASA missions, which Ferdowsi indicates has changed the way kids are seeing science and space, engaging people on a more regular, daily basis by telling the stories and keeping people excited and engaged about the NASA missions.

Leaf Mulch Program

Our fall 2014 leaves are being processed into garden mulch. Oakwood citizens will have two options again this year for obtaining the leaf mulch. For those who want mulch delivered, we offer 3 cubic yards for \$90 and 6 cubic yards for \$130. Please call 298-0777 to place an order. We will be taking orders beginning in March on a first come, first served basis. Mulch deliveries will take place on five Saturdays beginning on April 11 and ending on May 9.



On the same five Saturdays, residents can obtain free mulch from the public works center at 210 Shafor Blvd. between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., but must haul the material themselves and must provide proof of residency. The free mulch is for Oakwood residential use only. No commercial vehicles are permitted.

Free Dumpsters for Yard Debris

If you have a large amount of yard debris (green waste) and would like to use a dumpster for disposing of the material, rather than waiting for the regularly scheduled monthly pickup, please call 298-0777 to request a container drop-off. There is no charge when using dumpsters exclusively for yard debris disposal. Please consider coordinating the dumpster use with your neighbors.



Summer Employment Opportunities

Applications for summer employment with the City of Oakwood are now available at the OCC, the city building and on the city's website at www.oakwoodohio.gov. Students 16 years of age and older are eligible for lifeguard and concession positions at Gardner Pool. Telephone Directory Recycling

Residents may recycle telephone directories by delivering them to the city's drop off location at the Creager Field parking lot. Directories should be placed in the co-mingled recyclables container. Alternatively, they can be placed with regular weekly recycling but please consider the weight of the books and remember the 60 pound can limit.


Special Pickups

All Oakwood property owners are entitled to two special pickups per calendar year at no cost. Additional pickups will be charged at \$100 each. Special pickups are for large items only (e.g., furniture, appliances, etc.) and can be scheduled by calling 298-0777. If you are a tenant, you must coordinate your special pickups with the property owner. All items must be placed in an open area where the city bucket loader can safely access them (e.g., on driveways away from structures and fences).

Refuse Dumpsters

As an alternative to special pickups, and for remodeling projects and piles of small debris, residents can request refuse dumpsters. Dumpsters are for disposing of resident generated debris only (no contractor generated). There is a \$75 delivery and pickup charge for the dumpsters. The person requesting the dumpster will also be responsible for the costs incurred by the city for dumping the discarded materials.

Spring Yard and Garden Cleanup

The city collects yard debris monthly. Please refer to the enclosed map for your scheduled pickup days and plan your work accordingly. As you get ready to tackle the spring yard and garden projects, here are a few things to remember:

- Place larger piles of yard debris including brush and branches in the tree lawn area just behind the curb. Remember that branches should be no longer than 6 feet and should be placed in manageable piles. Also, please do not place these piles around trees, fire hydrants, cable TV boxes or posts/poles.
- Under no circumstance should you place anything except yard debris in the tree lawn area.
- The city will not pick up contractor generated material.
- If you have a large amount of yard debris, please call for a free dumpster, but remember that the dumpster must only include yard debris.
- Do not stack loose debris around or on top of garbage cans.
- Please remember the 35 gallon and 60 pound limits on trash cans and that all cans must have lids.
- Grass clippings are not accepted, either with regular trash or with curbside yard debris collection.



Yard Debris and Refuse Drop-off

The Foell Public Works Center at 210 Shafor Boulevard is open the first Saturday of each month for residents to drop off yard debris and other household waste and recycling, including large items such as furniture and appliances. If dropping off a refrigerator or freezer the Freon must be removed. For large amounts of construction debris, please use the dumpster program.

President's Day Trash Pickup

Please note that trash pickup for all routes the week of February 16 will be one day later than usual. Monday's route will be picked up Tuesday; Tuesday's route will be picked up on Wednesday; Wednesday's route will be picked up on Thursday and Thursday's route will be picked up Friday.



2015 Curb, Sidewalk and Driveway Apron Project

The 2015 curb, sidewalk and driveway apron repair project will take place in the area east of Far Hills from Aberdeen Avenue north to Patterson Road. The purpose of the program is to maintain the concrete structures located within the city rights-of-way in good, safe condition. We have begun inspecting the areas and marking sections of concrete requiring repairs. Residents affected by the work will receive personal notification regarding their responsibilities. For those who choose to do the repair work themselves, please remember to obtain a permit in advance and that all work must be completed and inspected by June 12.

2014 Oakwood income tax returns are due April 15, 2015.

The City of Oakwood has a mandatory filing requirement for all residents. Every individual, 18 years of age or older, who resides in Oakwood, must file an Oakwood City income tax return, whether or not any tax is due. Retired residents who have income derived exclusively from non-taxable sources (interest, dividend, social security and/or pension income, etc.) must notify the tax office in writing in order to be exempt from the filing requirement.

Should you require an extension of time to file your return, a copy of your federal extension must be submitted to our office on or before April 15, 2015. Payment of your estimated tax liability must

accompany the request as an extension of time to file is not an extension of time to pay the tax due. An underpayment penalty and interest charges will be assessed for all payments made after April 15th. If no extension is filed, a late filing fee will apply.

In an effort to reduce printing and mailing costs, the 2014 Oakwood income tax return is available on the City's web site at www.oakwoodohio.gov. If you do not have internet access, forms are available at the City administrative offices, Wright Memorial Public Library and the Oakwood Community Center.

If you need assistance with the preparation of your Oakwood income tax return, please visit the Tax Department before March 27, 2015. Normal business hours for the tax office are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended hours will be provided on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 13th through 15th, when the office will be open until 6:00 p.m.

Oakwood City Schools Preschool Program

In an effort to provide appropriate services to preschool-age children with disabilities, Oakwood City Schools operates an integrated preschool program. This program provides intervention services to children with disabilities designed to meet their specific needs and the opportunity to interact with typically developing children in a positive learning environment. The program operates four days per week with half-day sessions and enrolls preschool-age children with disabilities and typically developing children.

Process for Selecting Typically Developing Students

Typically developing preschool students are selected for the program by signing up on a waitlist. Students must be age 3 or 4 by September 30, 2015; be residents of the district; and be typically developing.

Applications for the waitlist will be made available beginning January 12, 2015 on the district's website and a print copy at any of the school buildings. Applications for placement in the 2015-2016 school year can be turned in starting at 7:30 a.m. on Monday, March 9, 2015 at Lange School. Applications that are mailed will be time-stamped as 4:00 p.m. the day that they are received by the school. Mailed applications that are received prior to March 9, 2015 will be considered received at 4:00 p.m. on March 9, 2015. Families will be notified of their number on the waitlist no later than March 31, 2015. Applicants who apply following March 31, 2015 will be notified immediately of their number on the waitlist.

Cost of the program for the 2015-2016 school year is \$1200 annually, payable quarterly. Families of students who receive a slot in the program are required to pay a \$300 non-refundable deposit by June 2, 2015, which will be applied to 1st quarter tuition. If the deposit is not received another student will be selected. Proof of residency is required at time of payment. Children With Disabilities

Ohio School Districts are required to provide free appropriate educational services to all children in their attendance areas who are ages 3 through 21 and who are determined to have a disability. Disability, in this case, means such conditions as hearing impairments, visual impairments, speech or language impairments, specific learning disabilities, emotional disturbance, multiple disabilities, cognitive disabilities, physical impairments, other health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury.

Schools are required to provide evaluations to determine if a child has such a disability. If you have or know of a child who may have a disability, contact your local school district for more information. 2015-2016 Kindergarten Registration

Parents who are considering Kindergarten for their children in the 2015-2016 school year should visit Lange School beginning March 2, 2015 to register. Children who will be five years old on or before September 30, 2015, may be registered for Kindergarten. Children who will be five years old between October 1, 2015 and January 1, 2015, may be considered for early entrance.




